How to help your child at home

Reading for Pleasure:

It is a pleasure to hear how many different genres Class 3 love to read. Please encourage a wide range of reading: fictional, non-fictional and even poetry.

Recommended reads for this term's topic are:

- This Morning I Met a Whale by Michael Morpurgo
- River Story by Meredith Hooper
- The Amazon River in a Rain Forest: Rivers Around the World by Molly Aloian
- Thames (River Adventures) by Paul Manning

When talking to your child about a book they are reading, encourage them to give reasons for their opinions.

Learning Through Play:

English: Wordsearches, Junior Scrabble, Boggle and Bananagrams .

Maths: Times Tables Rockstars, TopTrumps, dice games and recalling number bonds at speed.

English

Class 3 thoroughly enjoy reading and will continue to explore different genres by freely accessing fiction and non-fiction books every day. As this term's topic is based on the water cycle, we will draw from the text *The Little Raindrop* by Joanna Gray. Through Dance, Drama and exploring poetry techniques, your child will use their imagination to create a continued narrative that will be full of awe and wonder of the world around them.

During Reading Comprehension, children are in small groups to develop and hone their comprehension skills. Throughout this term, there will also be a focus on spelling, punctuation and grammar linking to factual and descriptive language. Children will continue to learn their weekly spellings.



Maths



The themes for this term are: multiplication and division; exploring calculation strategies and place value; measure, calculate and compare time; and money.

As children are expected to recall their 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10 times tables by the end of Year 3, they will need to continue practising their times tables for Friday's Times Tables Challenge, aiming to answer 40 questions within 3 minutes. Your child will have specific times tables to focus on and practise. Please encourage your child to learn their times tables at home. There are a number of ways they can learn them: Times Table Rockstars, quick firing questions, or throwing two dice for spontaneous recalling.

Topic

Flow is an exciting topic about the water cycle.

Your child will investigate and locate rivers,
mountains and seas using maps, globes and
atlases. They will also discover fascinating facts
about water and how it moves around the planet.





With water being essential for plants, we will also scientifically investigate plants and discover how water travels within them.

We will continue to tend to our allotment by taking care of the produce we are growing. So far we have successfully sown carrots, onions, potatoes, tomatoes and rocket. By the end of the term our goal will be to harvest the crop and enjoy tasting the fruits of our labour.

RHE

This term we will share our thoughts and feelings about why we should be active and sleep well.

PE

Our topic will be athletics and tennis where we will be working on five key skills which are: coordination, agility, balance, power and speed.

RE

As a class, we will explore our big question:

"How do Sikh people worship and celebrate?"
Together we will discover the religion's history and and what is at the heart of the Sikh faith today.



Music

Your child will continue to extend their knowledge and skill playing their recorder. As composers, they will write their own music creating pieces with the notes A, B, G, D and E using crochets, quavers and minims.

Drama

In Drama this term we will continue to explore Krindlekrax, the exciting story that we started last term. Using improvisation, drama strategies, discussion and dance we will focus on the characters, storyline and themes that arise from the text.

French

We will continue to practise using the French vocabulary learnt so far. Your child will also learn key phrases to enable them to have fun as they role play buying or selling fruit and vegetables in France.
