


Thursday

Activity: Preparing to write a story for tomorrow



This is a small excerpt from David Walliams' book 'Ratburger'. Today, you are to plan to write a story about YOU smuggling an animal (of your choice) into Holy Trinity, in the style of David Walliams.

Think carefully how you are to write the story. Please don't worry if you haven't read any of his books (although Mrs Marshall knows many of you have). As an author, David Walliams uses good descriptive language, humour and direct speech. This captivates the reader and creates many 'laugh out loud' moments. So this is your goal.

Activity 1: Create a writing frame - in your book, create this table and write as much detail as possible.

- 1) Referring to your writing frame and word bank, write your story, in the style of David Walliams. Remember your goal is for your reader to laugh out loud when they read your story.
- 2) Use the success criteria as a check list.

Success Criteria:

- ✓ Paragraphs
- ✓ Descriptive language
 - ✓ Humour
 - ✓ Direct speech
 - ✓ Commas for clarity

- 3) Read through your first draft and with a colour pen, or pencil, check and correct for improvements. Refer to ...
 - a. success criteria
 - b. vocabulary – use a dictionary and thesaurus
 - c. punctuation – is correctly in place
