Success Criteria:

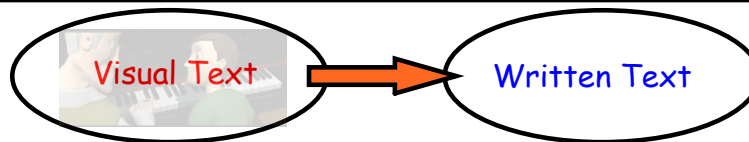
Change visual texts into written texts;

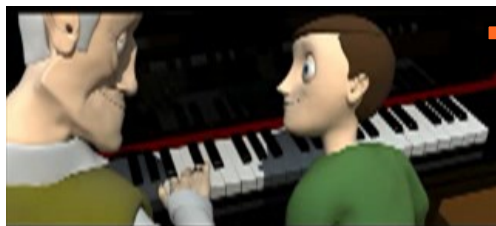
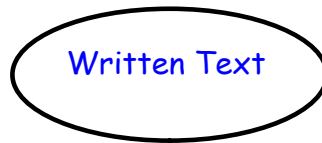
Explore his thoughts and feelings in depth.
